

Aging is a common agenda in ASEAN and Japan. However, there are time gaps among different countries.





Basic direction of aging cooperation of JICA

- Share Japan's past and current experiences and lessons including;
 - Responses to aging challenges in health
 - Human resource and service development for longterm care
 - Income security though pension system
 - Age-friendly environment
- Learn mutually for the common challenges in aging society including;
 - Integrated care in the community
 - Sustainability in finance and human resources



Study Program on Aging

- Group training course "Strengthening of Policy on Aging in Asia"
- A two-week course was organized in early September this year participated by 9 officials from 6 countries. The course will be organized in 2015 and 2016 as well.
- Program includes;
 - Lectures: what happened in the process of aging in Japan? what were the policy responses? what consequences?
 - Site visits: how to promote community-integrated care? how to provide facility and community-based services?
 - Simulated experience: how do elderly persons see their surroundings? how do they feel when they are walking?
 - Lively discussions with resource persons as well as among the participants

【Period】 14 January 2013∼31 August 2017 (4 years 8 months)

[Purpose]

Policy recommendations on the long-term care for the elderly are accepted by the relevant ministries and organizations.

[Outputs]

1.Policy recommendations on the long-term care for the elderly are developed, based on the evidence from the pilot projects and Thai and Japanese knowledge and experiences.

2. "Model Services" are developed and implemented in an effective and sustainable manner at pilot project sites.

3.Training programs of the care workers and coordinators are developed.
