Tokyo, Tohoku (support for recovery from the Great East Japan Earthquake)

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

Advancing to senior high school: 221 students (Enrollment rate: 100%)





In providing support to children and youths from poor families, in addition to economic capital (support for learning and life), it is also important to fulfill the need for cultural and social capital.



Cultural capital: Things (books, artworks, etc.), values (emphasis on academics, expectations of academic qualifications, etc.), behavioral patterns (effort, delaying the satisfaction of wants, etc.)

Social relationship capital: The overall means that can be utilized to watch over, care for, and nurture children who are embedded in a human network


Reality for Senior High School Students Living in Poverty

- Compulsory education in Japan lasts till junior high school, so there is mostly little or no support for education and the nurturing of youths after graduation from junior high school.
- As a result, youths from low-income families have to earn their own living expenses while studying, which in turn leads to dropping out of school or other consequences.
 - Unable to go to school as they are working part-time to cover the costs of attending senior high school
 - Unable to go to school as they cannot afford to buy seasonal commuting tickets for school
 - Repeating school years as they are unable to attend cram school, etc. despite poor academic performance—Dropping out of school
 - Isolated due to poverty and inability to make friends, which in turn leads to dropping out of school, etc.

Dropping out of senior high school is not the students' fault for being lazy, but the result of falling victim to a skewed society.

Issues in Supporting Youths in Japan

Current support provided: Employment support is a welfare system that youths who have dropped out of senior high school can utilize

As they are still children of 16 or 17 years old, they do not like attending occupational training alongside with adults.

Difficult to make these youths independent due to long period of social isolation.

Takes effort, cost, and time (Require support of more than one year in some cases)



New Form of Youth Support: Relearning

Preventing youths from dropping out of senior high school and relearning project to provide support for achieving upper secondary school graduate certifications

Provision of places of belonging that can be used for free, as well as free meals, for senior high school students from low-income families and youths up to 25 years old who have dropped out of senior high school 4-5 days per week 15:00-20:30

- Free learning support for students who are close to dropping out of senior high school due to poor academic performance – Prevent dropping out
 Free learning support to obtain upper secondary school graduate certification for youths who have dropped out of senior high school
- Meals support to maintain their health

In cooperation with high schools and welfare organizations

- •Follow-up on schoolwork before students drop out
- •Seamless support after they drop out

Employment without social isolation or blank periods (Happiness for person in question and family)

Employment, marriage, birth, etc.

Through support from the early stages, it is possible to eliminate the period of social isolation and to minimize economic loss and welfare support.
