



10 commitments under Regional Plan of Action

- Promote shared responsibilities in supporting care givers
- Promote intergenerational solidarity
- Promote rights-based/needs-based and lifecycle approach, and eliminate all forms of maltreatment base on old age
- Mainstream ageing into public policies and national development plans, programmes
- Promote the development of human capital

- Development of reliable, evidence-based, gender-disaggregated data on ageing
- Strengthen capacity of all stakeholders and improve delivery services at all levels
- Encourage development of older people's associations or other form of networking
- Promote age-friendly communities/cities
- Build and strengthen networking and partnership within and among AMS, and with other partners



Study on Old-Age Income Security in ASEAN Member States: Policy Trends, Challenges and Opportunities

- Led by MOLISA Viet Nam, published in 2021
- Analysed responsiveness of AMS' social protection to the old-age population, including pension schemes.
- Highlighted the need for AMS to have a pro-active strategy to extend coverage to all population and to ensure adequacy and the sustainability of old age pension systems.
- Among others, recommended AMS to set common ASEAN targets in terms of pension coverage and for AMS to approach pension policies in a more comprehensive way.
- Followed-up through a series of Capacity Building Webinars on Social Protection for AMS


First webinar: 15 August 2022 "Integrated approach on extending social protection"

The 9th ASEAN Labour Inspection Conference

- Hosted by Singapore, 27-28 May 2021 Virtually
- Theme: Strengthening Labour Inspection Capability in the Post COVID-19 Era
- Among others, the Conference called for better support of mental health at the workplace as it is important to both individuals as well as productivity of businesses.



More specifically, the Conference recommended AMS to:

- 1. Incorporate mental well-being into companies OSH systems and policies
- 2. De-stigmatise mental health issues at the workplace
- 3. Support employers to better manage the well-being of employees.

ASEAN Declaration on the Protection of Migrant Workers and Family Members in Crisis Situation and its Guidelines

- Led by Indonesia, adopted by the 42nd (Declaration) and 43rd (Guidelines) ASEAN Summits in 2023.
- Among others, the ASEAN Declaration called AMS to facilitate timely access of all migrant workers affected by crises to psychosocial support
- Provision of psychosocial support is also identified as one of the guiding principles of the Guidelines and as one of the means in supporting ASEAN migrant workers in post-crisis recovery.
